her new S3 bike (page 7), and a triathlete friend of mine wrote a great piece about swimming in the open water (page 6).



WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN CAMPAGNOLO AND SHIMANO?

This is a question that I get asked at least once a day here in the shop. People read magazine reviews, or talk with friends that own bicycles, and develop questions about the differences. The answer could fill a book if you catch me on the right day, but I'll try and keep it shorter than that for this article and not get bogged down in minutiae. To keep it a little shorter, I'll just cover what I think to be the most important component and that is the Shift/Brake levers.

There are 4 important parts to the answer:

Functionality • Comfort • Serviceability • Price

1.) Functionality - Several years ago, the component companies pulled a cruel trick on us here in the Northwest. They invented shifters called STI (Shimano) or Ergo (Campagnolo). These new shifters were mounted right inside of the brake levers and were much more convenient to use. Unfortunately, along with this came new derailleurs that were designed to work only with specific gear configurations for the front chain rings. But, here in the Northwest, we are either riding downhill or uphill and rarely on flat ground. (I discovered this when I first moved here from Southern Idaho and rode my bike to work for the first day). See, most places don't need quite the range of gears that we use here. We started selling the Shimano STI shifters when they came out with a model that would shift a 'triple' chain ring. Then we started changing out the chain ring sizes for people to meet their specific needs (as we always had done before). The Shimano manual said that the chain rings must be specific sizes, but who believes what they say anyway? Well, in this case they were right. If we varied even slightly from the stock setup, the bike just wouldn't shift smoothly (or at all). So, we investigated other options.

The Campagnolo shifters use a different method of shifting for the front derailleur, allowing us many more options for chain ring sizes. This was the first reason we started to use the Campagnolo shifters for tandems and touring bikes (these folks are much more likely to want wider gear ranges).

Obviously, we sell both brands, and both Shimano and Campagnolo shifters work very well. The Shimano setup has evolved to be a little more flexible than it originally was. If a customer has a need to vary his or her gearing up front though, the Campagnolo is still more flexible and works better for that.

2.) Comfort - Here is a feature often overlooked by a customer shopping for a new bike, but is by far the most important consideration when choosing components. Since comfort is so important, I always have people try the feel of both shifters before deciding. Both brands work well mechanically, and do what they are supposed to do, but Campagnolo has taken the next step and redesigned their shifter to fit the human hand better. If your bike is fit to you properly, you're riding on the top of the brake hoods 70-80% of the time. Therefore, it makes sense to make that position the most comfortable position on your bike. If you look at the Campagnolo design carefully, you'll see a difference in the way it fits the hand. Campagnolo redesigned the shifter in about 1998 and our customers have loved them ever since. All it takes is a guick grab on both shifters to feel the difference. Most people prefer the smaller, thinner feel of the Campagnolo. They also like the way that the shifter mounts flat and becomes an extension of the handle bar. There is another difference in the comfort factor. If you look closely

at both shifters, you'll see that the pivot point for the braking mechanism is mounted higher on the Campagnolo. This means that when you are braking from the top of the hoods, it requires less leverage. I consider this a comfort issue because in the Northwest, if you're not climbing, you're braking. The leverage advantage to the Campagnolo means less work for your hands, so it's more comfortable.

The last thing that I would say about comfort is to compare the front shifting of each make. The Shimano requires that the brake lever be pushed sideways a considerable amount before the shift is made. The Campagnolo can be pushed a few clicks, then returned to resting, and then a few more to make a shift. This becomes a comfort issue if you have smaller hands than the average male that the shifters were all designed for. For people with smaller hands or shorter fingers, the Campagnolo is usually the preferred choice.

3.) Serviceability - Here is the closest that I will tread to minutiae. Keep in mind that I've been a bicycle mechanic since I was the 8 year old kid who fixed any bike tires that were brought in to my father's gas station in Jerome Idaho (a town of about 2,000 back then). Being able to repair something runs in my blood, so if there is ever a choice between buying something that is repairable vs. buying something that is disposable, guess where I go?

No matter how good something is, some part of it will wear out at some time. Campagnolo shifters are built with serviceability in mind. They are bolted together, the Shimano is more or less riveted together. The small parts list for the Campagnolo shifters is 5 pages long. I can order any small part for a Campagnolo shifter and fix any problem that it might have. This level of serviceability carries through to the entire line of everything Campagnolo makes, derailleurs, hubs, etc.

Shimano components are made with more of a 'replacement' philosophy. The small parts available list for all models of Shimano shifters is less than 1/2 page, and contains very basic parts only (name plate, name plate screw etc...). Almost every Shimano shifter that goes bad requires a new shifter to be installed, and that costs a lot more than just fixing an old one. The replacement philosophy carries through to everything that Shimano makes. While there is nothing wrong with either philosophy, the Campagnolo serviceability philosophy just fits in better with my own, and that's one reason that I prefer it.

4.) Price - There is a difference on the price between the two. Bicycles equipped with Shimano are available at price levels from \$450 and up, whereas Campagnolo equipped bicycles start at \$1,100 or so. If you're shopping for a new bike, and your price range doesn't allow you to go over \$1,000, Shimano is really the only choice. But, if you're budget allows you to go over \$1,000, I recommend that you try both and pick the brand that's comfortable for you.





A Swim in the Wild



Let me introduce my good friend Paul Lundgren.

I've known Paul since we were 12 years old. Paul and I used to be swimming rivals from different small towns back in Idaho. Shortly after we graduated from high school he called me to buy a bike as he was getting into triathlons. I was running a very small bike shop out of my garage back in Jerome Idaho. He bought a sweet blue Basso equipped with Dura-Ace. Over the next few years he became an accomplished triathlete and eventually wound up riding for Quintana Roo in the late 80's and early 90's.

Amongst his many accomplishments, in 1995 he swam 465 miles down the Salmon River to bring attention to the dwindling Sockeye Salmon population.

Through evolution he lives in Northern California and runs a company selling wet suits to shops like us. I asked him to write an article for our customers to tell you about the benefits of wet suits.



A Swim in the Wild

It is one thing to swim across an indoor heated pool for the first time and quite another swimming in a lake, ocean, river, or pond. Add 500 athletes doing the same thing, going the same place, at the same time, and all in a big ass hurry. Welcome to the start of a triathlon. Coming from a competitive swimming background I never imagined finding myself in a state of fear doing a swim. That is, not until I heard a good friend of mine tell me about the time he got hit by a hammerhead shark in Boca Raton, Florida during a triathlon. The next time I did an open water swim in the ocean I found I spent more time looking at the shadows in the dark deep blue than the buoys marking the course. Needless to say it affected my performance.

FDR said, "The only thing we have to fear...is fear itself..." I guess he never did much open water swimming. However, if we think about it and our destiny is to be dinner for a shark then there is not much we can do. I guess we could avoid open water swimming, but we could stay home on the couch all day too. All of that being said the only thing we truly have control over is our mind. Sharks, swimmers, jelly fish, currents are all things that will do what they are going to do no matter how much we worry about them. I personally have come to the conclusion if a person wants to be an open water swimmer they should focus their mind on the swimming part and let the river, so to speak, flow its course. So...FDR may have been an open water swimmer after all.

What can you do? You're in the open water for your first race and you want to know what you can do. The first thing I would recommend is buying a wetsuit for competitive swimming. This is not your typical surf or dive suit, but a triathlon

wetsuit designed to fit based on height and weight. Not only will it keep you warm, it will give you the lift swimmers spend years working to achieve. The buoyancy of the rubber lifts your legs and body to the surface of the water where your body is in a position to create less drag while swiftly streamlining through the water. The design of the panels allows arm movement where it needs it and buoyancy and warmth where it can. For you long term competitive swimmers who think your feel for the water will be lost if you put on a full sleeve wetsuit, maybe so, but if you want to go faster take my word, and wear a full sleeve, full leg wetsuit.

Now that you absolutely know a wetsuit will make you faster and possibly safer, what else? Where the mind goes the body follows. Think about what you can do. You can breathe and this is a great place to focus your attention while swimming. Deep relaxed breathing is much better than shallow panicked breathing. Counting strokes one, two, breathe, stroke, stroke, breathe is a great rhythm. Both the mind and body move most efficiently while in a state of rhythm. Everyone has a rhythm that helps bring them to a state of peace and athletic potential. In the excitement of the event many swimmers find themselves trying too hard and moving too fast. This creates disharmony in the mind and body. Keep the rhythm relaxed and comfortable while executing long, strong strokes.

A whole book could be written on open water swimming, but I will leave you with one more tip. Before the event, get in the water and familiarize yourself with the environment. You need no more surprises than the ones that will

naturally come. You want to know the temperature of the water and how it feels. Will it take you a few strokes to catch your breath before you can relax from the cold? If so, make sure you jump in beforehand so the shock is not during the race. Know the currents, if any. If the water flows to the right then you will want to align yourself to the left at the start. Landmarks are for navigation help, so familiarize yourself while in the water and make mental notes of landmarks to watch as you travel the course.

Good luck, and welcome to one of the most enjoyable natural experiences this planet has to offer, a swim in the wild.

I just received my new Rodriguez S3 bike at the start of this triathlon season and what a way to start out! I was riding a carbon fiber triathlon bike for many years so I was concerned about the weight of my new S3 bike. Well I was so happy when the bike frame tipped the scales at only 2.2 pounds and my complete bike is <u>lighter</u> than my old carbon fiber bike! I now have a 17 pound complete bike made of steel. The ride is great! The steel frame rides smooth and comfortable! Last weekend in my first 1/2 Ironman race of the season I recorded a bike split 10 minutes faster than last year! My great custom fit keeps me comfortable in the aero position and the light and responsive frame climbs great!

I made one more change this year too. Most of my summers are spent racing in triathlons, but this summer my husband and I are traveling to France to ride in the Alps and watch a few days of the Tour de France! With all the climbing I wanted to set my bike up for road riding and I made the switch to Campagnolo Ergo levers. I prefer these over the

Shimano STI for many reasons. One is the ease of shifting with the ergo. My small hands have no problems shifting these levers. The travel or throw on the STI levers was always too long and so hard to do with my small hands. The Ergo levers just fit my hands well so it is a comfortable position for riding all day.

Day two:







STRETCH YOUR BUDGET, NOT YOUR CHAIN

Do you change the oil in your car? Most people will change the oil in their car every 3,000 to 4,000 miles as their manufacturer suggests. Why do they do it? It's still oil when the mechanic drains it out of the engine right? Isn't it still lubricating the parts inside the engine? But still it is drained out of the engine and brand new oil is poured in it's place. The reason that the oil should be changed at a certain mileage is simply preventative maintenance. The engine would continue to run on the same oil for 10's of thousands of miles, but slowly it would wear out, and the engine would become damaged. This is a much more expensive repair than regular oil changes.

The same is true for the chain on your bicycle. The chain on a bicycle is engaging on the gears on the front and back of the bicycle. The chain is manufactured with exactly 1/2" of space between each link, and the gears are precisely manufactured to 'mesh' with the chain. The chain is under incredible strain because the force and leverage that a cyclist applies. The chain is also subject to sand and other road grime that collect and act as abrasives that wear away the metal that it is made of. Even with these factors, a chain can last for 10's of thousands of miles just like the oil in your car. But, over time, the chain will stretch. As the chain begins to stretch, and is no longer 1/2" between each link. As it stretches, it wears the metal from the teeth of the gears to match it's new length. If a chain is allowed to stretch too far, it will wear all of the gears on the bicycle so much that they will not 'mesh' with a new chain. If a new chain is installed at this point, the chain will 'slip' on most of the worn gears and create a lot of rumbling noise on the others. Often a customer will come in with a chain that is so far stretched that the bike won't shift well, or

the chain may even be broken. At this point, all of the gears have to be replaced and the repair bill is much greater than it would have been if we had just replaced a chain earlier.

What's the recommendation? On modern bikes we are seeing that people are getting about 1500 - 2000 miles before a new chain is recommended. On a tandem it's more like 1000 - 1500 miles. I've seen

some people get 3000 - 4000 miles with minimal stretch, but that's the exception. I recommend that you start having your shop—check your chain stretch at 1500 miles, and then every 500 miles after that. If you replace your chain at the first sign of stretch it will cost you about \$30. If you wait until your rear cogs have to be replaced along with your chain it will run approx. \$100. And if you wait until your chain just breaks and all of your gears need replacing it will run from \$250 to \$400 or so.

A BLAST FROM THE PAST!

I was in the repair shop today and I noticed that there were 3 of the stainless steel bikes that we made back in '99 in there for tune-ups. We only made 50 of them, so it was pretty amazing to have 3 of them in at once. A closer look revealed that one of them belonged to Jackie. Jackie is one of my favorite customers. We like the same music, and when she comes in, the guys in the repair shop always switch the music to what she likes. So I get at least a few moments with my favorite music. I always liked the look of the stainless steel bikes that we made, and I always like to hear those classic 'blasts from the past'.



In the year 1999, we produced just 50 Rodriguez bicycles out of stainless steel. The bikes had no paint, and no decals. The Rodriguez logo was sandblasted into the polished stainless steel downtube, and the back of the bike was blasted except for the Rodriguez logo on the seat tube. Jackie's bike is exceptionally cool (black and white photo doesn't do it justice) because it has yellow spokes, handlebar tape, cable housing, tires, bottle cages and pedals. This bike just looks hot!




